Urban heritage, (over-)tourism and temporary migration: links and challenges

Abstract: Heritage-rich cities are not only attractive for tourists, but for a variety of temporary populations whose impact is normally addressed separately, in terms of, e.g., over-tourism, studentification or transnational gentrification. The presentation will show that, when viewed from the perspective of the sociospatial relations those populations have in and with the city, many similarities emerge in their urban practices, characteristics, locational choices, and in the effects they produce at the urban and neighbourhood scale. The presentation will highlight those links as well as the challenges cities face in dealing with temporary inhabitants, with a particular focus on the city of Rome.

Between public history and service design: participatory methodologies for heritage enhancement

Abstract: Social sustainability is a broad concept fostering both participatory approaches and cultural diversity promotion in designing heritage enhancement. Its impact on many disciplines has been strong, such as some of the new research approaches can be considered a way to implement sustainable social processes. Public history and service design are a case in point. Public history pursues the collaboration between historians and the local community to make history a vivid knowledge supporting civic engagement and the peaceful coexistence of different (sometimes contrasting) communities. Service design is a new approach in planning and implementing new services and products based on the co-creation between users and producers. Their use in heritage management paves the ways to a stronger involvement of local communities, but of course opens also new challenges and issues, which deserves to be discussed.

This lesson provides a snapshot of Albanians in Italy who are working in sectors with the potential for future benefit to Albania. It examines the socio-economic characteristics, expectations, and plans of Albanians in Italy. This community is highly integrated into local society, nevertheless its relationship with Italy is not always smooth, with many haunted by memories of difficulties in the early days following their arrival, and continued stigmatization. Despite this, most see their future in Italy while experiencing a complicated relationship with Albania, a place to return for short visits – but perhaps never to settle in again.

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


